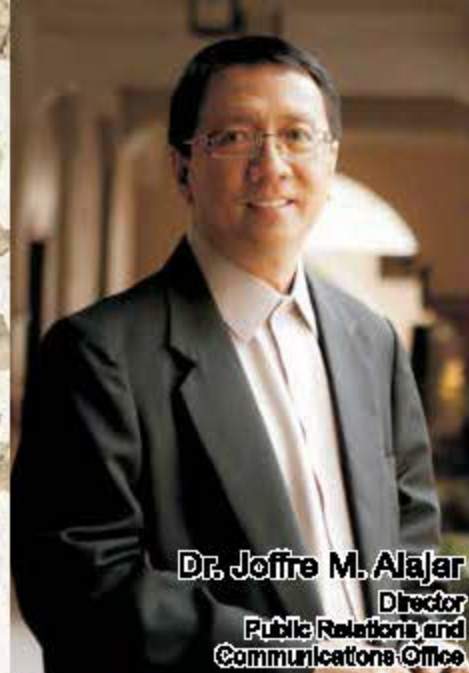

San Beda College's Wellspring of Strengths

1. A Graduate School of Business that continues to improve and innovate, to raise the bar in the development and implementation of its various MBA and DBA programs.
2. A Graduate School of Liturgy that persists to be a strong partner of the Catholic Church in forming hearts and minds of the faithful, and in shaping the life of the basic Christian community.

3. A Graduate School of Law that serves as a center of scholarly studies in the discipline of law making available the highest standards of advanced legal education in the country.

4. A College of Medicine that grows by leaps and bounds, exhibiting exemplary passing percentage, and producing a number of topnotchers in the Physician board examinations. Its faculty and students research teams have been garnering top places in various national Medical Research Competitions.

5. A College of Nursing that persists to produce quality nurses and delivers high performance in board examinations amid national limitations and global challenges.

8. An integrated Basic Education Department at the sprawling ten-hectare campus in San Beda Rizal that highlights outstanding educational service and performance when it received series of five-year Level II re-accreditation status until 2018. Since 2004, we have clustered our Grade School and High School departments under the Integrated Basic Education Department. Our K-12 program is now operational in San Beda Rizal while San Beda Manila will also offer Grades 11 and 12 starting next AY 2016-17.

9. A significant increase in student enrollment of about 9,416.

The University Proposal was approved by the Benedictine Community and the Board of Trustees on October 2014. A Special Committee is now working on the various documents for our application for University-hood by 2017. But there are still challenges that we have to face and conquer. Let me share these with you.

Challenge #3: Boost partnerships with local, regional, and international academic institutions.

In this era of cross border mobility and open competition for the services of professionals, it is important that we train the mindset of our students towards an outward global perspective, and this, we can do if we partner actively with academic institutions here and abroad.

Challenge #4: Reach 20,000 student enrollees by 2022.



Challenge #5: Upgrade Research program to drive Faculty Excellence.

Research development plan has been laid out beginning with our initial research fund to further harness the research capabilities among our faculty and administrators.

- 5.1 Have 20% or 30 (*whichever is higher*) of the full-time faculty actively engaged in research as evidenced by refereed publications and other scholarly outputs.
- 5.2 Have 5% of the full-time actively engaged in research have published their researches and/or with patents.
- 5.3 Create a research fund that would meet the minimum CHED requirement of Php2,250,000 representing research cost expenditure for the last 5 years equivalent to at least Php75,000 for each of the 30 full-time faculty members involved in research.

While the SBC Alumni Foundation's 17 professorial chairs are well appreciated, I humbly challenge the foundation to triple the number of professorial chairs by 2017 to further beef up our research funds.

Challenge #6: Meet the CHED requirements on campus capacity through either the vertical expansion of the property in Manila or the conversion of certain buildings into a library, additional classrooms, and multi-purpose halls.

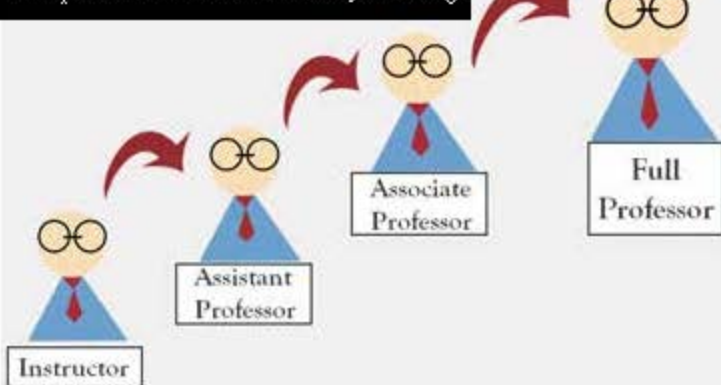

The SBC College of Accountancy and Business (CAB)

Cognizant of the continuing developments in higher education, a proposal for the separation of the Accountancy and Business programs from the College of Arts and Sciences (CAS) has been approved recently by the SBC Board of Trustees.

Justifications for the CAB:

1. The PAASCU Accreditation Teams who visited San Beda College in 2009 and March 2015 reiterated this recommendation under the Administration survey area, viz:
2015 - *"In light of the definition of what a Liberal Arts program should be, the Accounting and Business Programs should not be under the College of Liberal Arts (Arts and Sciences)."*
2009 - *"The Arts and Sciences programs and the Business programs have to be placed under two separate academic units each headed by an academically qualified administrator."*
2. One of the CHED requirements for the proposed San Beda University is the offering of Liberal Arts courses. To meet this requirement, new course offerings shall be opened: AB Political Science and Public Administration, AB English and AB Literature. Said courses together with the existing General Education program and science course offerings, namely: BS Economics & Public Policy, BS Psychology and BS Biology will appropriately make up the "new" College of Arts and Sciences. Thus, the Accountancy and Business programs, by the very nature of their fields of study, should be separated from the "new" CAS.
3. The Accountancy (BS Accountancy) and Business (BS Entrepreneurship, BS Legal Management, BSBA in Financial Management, BSBA in Marketing Management, BSBA in Operations Management, BSBA in Human Resource Development Management and BS Information and Communication Technology) courses remain to be in-demand career programs, both nationally and globally. The BS Accountancy is one of SBC's flagship programs, with distinct needs and requirements to include the tough CPA licensure examinations. The business environment that our students will be entering into later is a much more complex place. They are facing the challenges of expanded responsibilities, more nuanced standards, and the forthcoming economic integration of ASEAN member nations. Thus, the need for accountancy and other business courses to be provided special focus and extra attention with the proposed College of Accountancy and Business (CAB).

Effective AY 2016-17

SBC-CAS offers Bachelor in Physical Education Major in Sports and Wellness Management

"Physical Education as an academic discipline and as a profession plays an important role in human development and continues to expand at a fast rate. By their very nature, physical education and sports are about participation, inclusion and a sense of belonging. They bring individuals and communities together, highlighting commonalities and bridging cultural and ethnic divides". With this rationale lifted from CMO no. 23, the College of Arts and Sciences will be offering effective AY 2016-17, a four-year course Bachelor of Physical Education major in Sports and Wellness Management (BPE-WN).

The Bachelor of Physical Education is a four-year program with a primary goal of providing the students with a broadly based understanding of the discipline through theoretical and practical courses in physical education and sports management. This program allows maximum opportunity for students to pursue various combinations of courses in teaching, coaching programming and administration, and within their particular areas of interest.

The two majorship offering shall allow every student the option of taking to select either teacher education training program called BPE-School Physical Education or a program that caters to the need of the corporate industry called BPE-Sports and Wellness Management (no professional requirement for Teacher Education) focused on the sports and wellness courses.

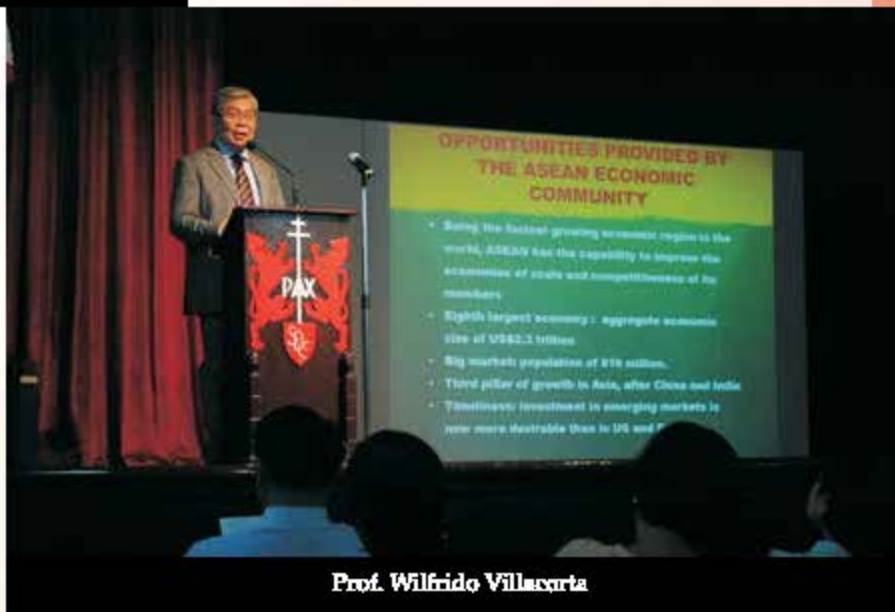

Ramos is the 12th president of the Republic of the Philippines, who is best remembered for his ability to lead and willingness to be led – not by astute advisors and political strategists, but by the people whom he served, and served well. Steadfastly and faithfully, he promoted the principles of people empowerment and a culture of excellence that led to global competitiveness during his term from 1992 to 1998. He is appreciated as the leader who quickly led the nation out of darkness by putting an end to the power crisis that crippled homes and industries.

He exemplified the leader who always looked toward a strategic future and whose thumbs-up optimism – captured in descriptive phrases like *"Caring, Sharing and Daring,"* *"Philippines 2000"* and *"Pole-vaulting"* – propelled the economy, alleviated poverty, implemented social reforms, and cleaned up Manila's vast garbage dump called *"Smokey Mountain."* Known for his positive energy, he pursued, focused and aligned programs to fight poverty.

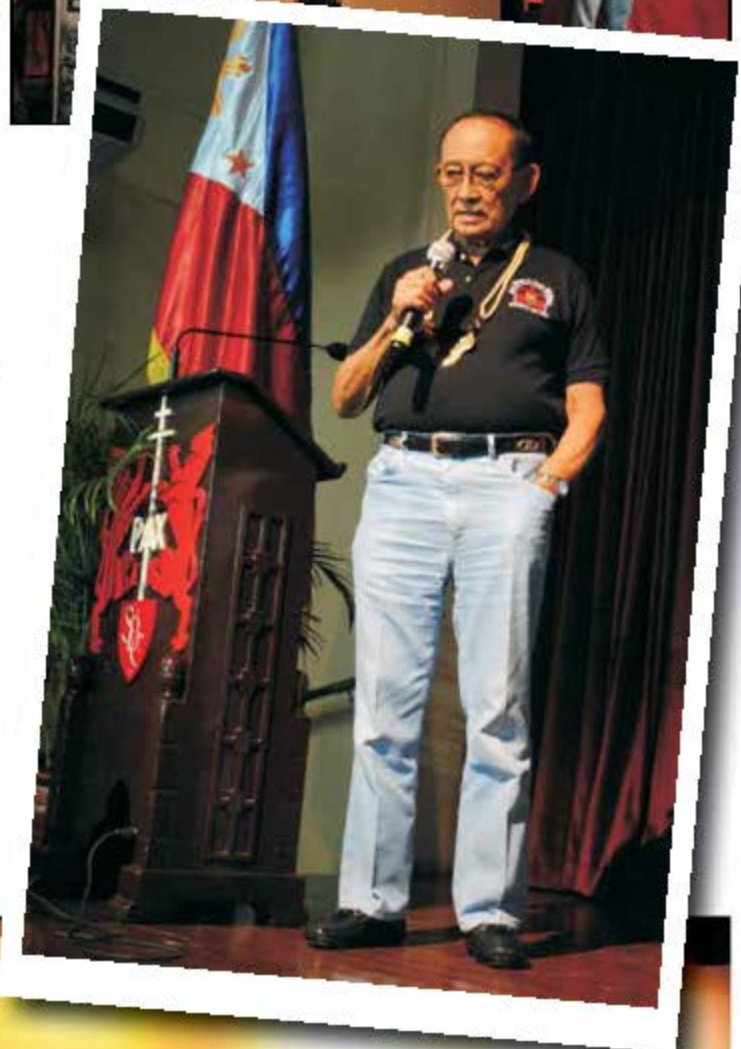

dramatically and a comprehensive Social Reform Agenda (SRA) addressed long-standing problems regarding poverty, health, education and skills training, housing, environmental protection, children and the youth, the elderly and the handicapped, jobs and livelihood, agrarian reform and access to equal opportunity. Gross National Product averaged five percent annually. The total forex inflow into the country outpaced the combined forex inflows during the Marcos and Cory Aquino Administrations. The per capita income of Filipino families increased during his administration than in the preceding two administrations. He pushed for deregulation of key industries and economic liberalization. He encouraged privatization of public entities, to include the modernization of public infrastructure through the expanded Building-Operate-Transfer (BOT) law. His public service spanned a total period of 51 years.

Ramos also served as Chief of Staff of the Armed Forces of the Philippines (1986-1988) as a four-star general and Secretary of National Defense (1998- 1990). His military and law enforcement service of more than 40 years was capped by the peaceful, non-violent EDSA People Power Revolution in February 1986.

In retirement, he seems to be always on-the-go throughout the Philippines, energizing the citizenry and pushing the "best practices" of Unity of Purpose, Solidarity in Values, and Teamwork in Nation-building at every opportunity. Ever the international diplomat and Philippine cheerleader, he personally interacts with many leaders in various strategic and intellectual for a around the world. He currently serves as chairman of the Ramos Peace and Development (RPDEV) Foundation.

Students from Southeast Asia and beyond converged in the Philippines as the Office of International Cooperation (OIC) stages its second run of the Social Enterprise for Economic Development (SEED) in Manila, Baguio and Mountain Province. According to Dr. Tita Branzuela, OIC Director, "The program, which ran from July 27 to August 9 offered structured opportunities for students all over the world to interact, unite and conduct on-site research as basis for development of real-time business plans."

Local and foreign participants experienced immersion in the cool highlands of Bauko in Mountain Province. "Their contextualized encounter with the locals gave them basis for developing appropriate business strategies which were presented to a panel of experts for defense, social entrepreneurs for possible financing of plans and the locals to learn the principles and theories of business," Dr. Branzuela added. On the observation that SEED 2015 treads up-spiral, the Very Reverend Aloysius Maranan, SBC Rector-President, mentioned "We meticulously developed a learning design that best complements our framework which articulates the Program's content and performance standards, performance indicators and rubrics for assessment to ensure the acquisition of vital competencies for work, life and citizenship in a global 21st century."

Compared to other SEED programs in Asia, SBC's 2015 run in the Philippines gathered the biggest number of foreign delegates. Norielyn Tabag, OIC's newest associate in tandem with Joel Filamor, SEED Philippines Program Chair remarked "This year's SEED Program gathered 23 local and 42 foreign students hailing from 9 countries and 11 universities around the world."

SEED Philippines 2015 is organized by San Beda Office of International Cooperation in collaboration with the Asia Research Center (ARC) Chair for International Management (South East Asia) University of St. Gallen, Switzerland, the ASEAN Learning Network and the SBC Benedictine Educational Foundation, Incorporated headed by its CEO, Fr. Bede S. Hechanova, OSB.

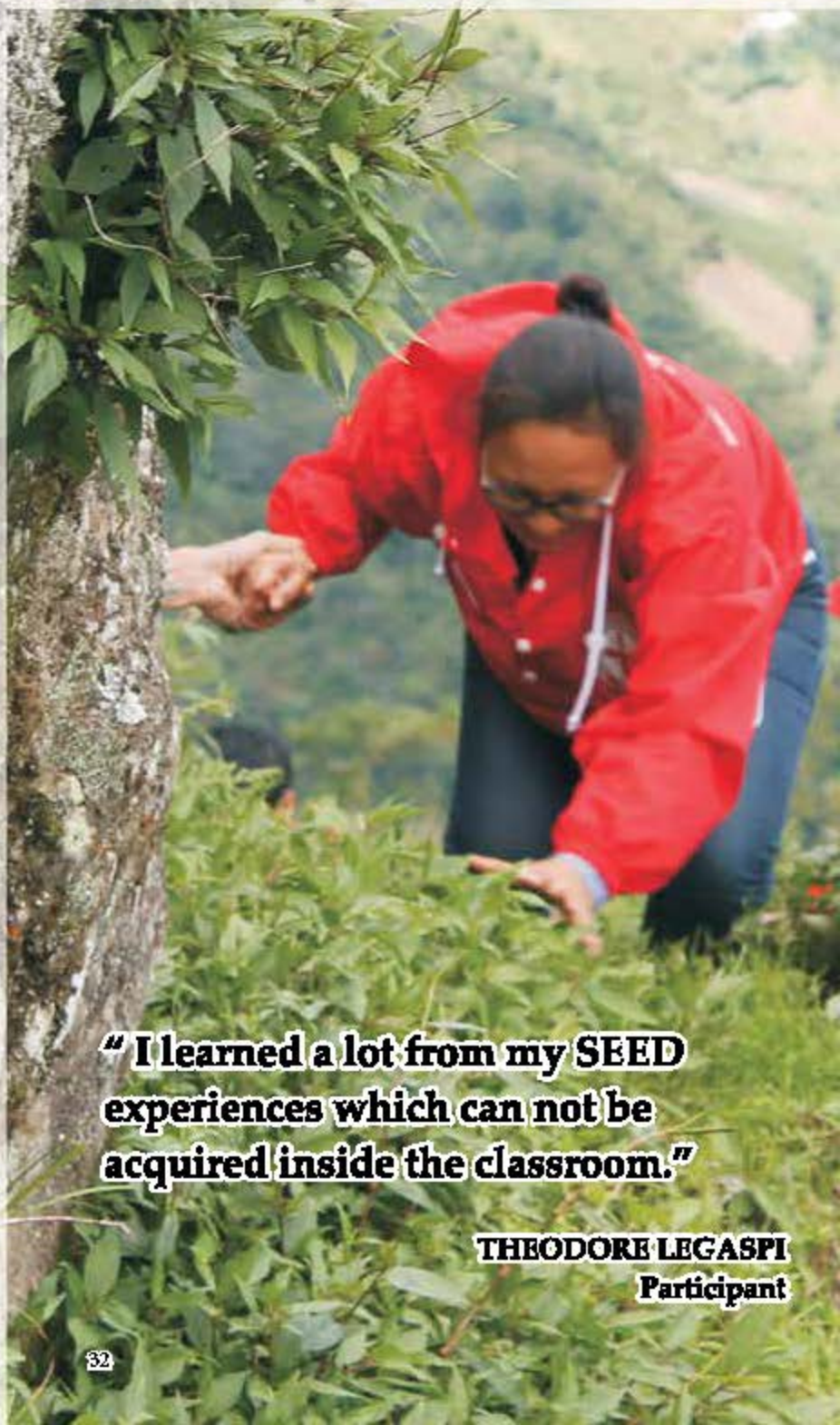

THE BEDAN COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT PROGRAMS TOWARDS A HOLISTIC-DRIVEN PARADIGM

Community engagements in higher educational institution's set-up should be seen as complimentary entity to research and instruction that will result to a dynamic and integrated formation of all its stakeholders. It is in this context that the San Beda Institutional Community Involvement Center (ICIC) develops programs that can provide opportunities for our faculty, students and administrators to maximize their field of expertise to help people help themselves. What goes along in our preparation to become a university is the need to increase for outputs both in community based researches and projects that will impact people's lives in the areas of livelihood, health, environment, advocacy, literacy, morals and other components on community development. This is the reason why ICIC follows the model of community engagement that is interdisciplinary, cross cultural, integrative, disciplinal and research based initiatives.

For the first semester of academic year 2015-2016, each college designed programs that match its expertise. CAS faculty members were active in the business clinic program, psychology clinic and HEALS or health, environment, advocacy, literacy and spirituality. The College

of Law has always been represented by the regular operations of the Legal Aid Bureau with student interns and faculty working together in responding to the needs of the indigent clients be it in their main office in San Beda main campus, community based legal aid clinic in Sinag sa Sais, Pandacan, Manila and the services done in Quiapo Church as the school's answer to the call of Archbishop Antonio Tagle in promoting social justice. The College of Medicine and Nursing have initiated Medical Missions and implemented their service learning courses to their chosen sites.

The Integrated Basic Education Department has their share in leveling up our extension services by responding where they are invited to give leadership trainings, K to 12 preparations and improving instruction methods to our target beneficiaries.

To keep our programs updated, ICIC did networking and benchmarking with top universities and institutions in the field of community development.

Some of the sample projects that can serve as best practices are the following:

College of Arts and Sciences Business Clinic Program

Business Clinic in Bauko, Mt. Province, May 1-3, 2015.

This was followed by a cross cultural exposure on June 2-6, 2015.



Sustaining the Mushroom Growing Livelihood Initiative in Pacil, Mt. Province by a Seminar on Product Marketing, Good Manufacturing Practices and Proper Labeling by San Beda Enactus with the Junior Marketing Association of the Philippines last September 24-27, 2015.



CAS faculty at work: teaching basic bookkeeping and good manufacturing practices to indigenous villagers for their mushroom and potato chips livelihood programs



The Mushroom Growing Project in the village of Pactil, Bauko, Mt. Province was started in 2011 with the San Beda College Benedictine Educational Foundation Inc. (SBCBEFI) as the main donor funding for the resource speakers, equipment and logistical concerns. Together with SBCBEFI, ICIC conducted technical and capacity trainings to equip the 65 members the capacity to be self-reliant and independent. ICIC formed them to an organization called the St. Bede Mushroom and Vegetable Growers Association (SBMVGA).

San Beda collaborated the project with the local government of Bauko, Mountain Province with their council passing a resolution to donate a land and a budget for an erection of mushroom building laboratory. The

amount allotted by LGU Bauko for the project is Php1,000,000.

LGU Bauko facilitated the release of the DOST Cordillera fund to buy an important equipment, the autoclave or sterilizer. It was already delivered to our beneficiaries. The said item costs is Php 290,00, and this will pave way to increase the production.

A seminar workshop and review of business processes were conducted by the Enactus members and BCP professors. The team monitored the operation processes, checked the laboratory environment and facilities, mentored members on proper bookkeeping and other aspects of the livelihood initiative.

Processed Vegetable Products: Potato Chips and Carrot Jam



Processed vegetable products, the potato chips and carrots jam are project interventions to the problem of the low prices offered by the middlemen to fresh carrots and potatoes during seasons when the production is high. The cost per kilo to these vegetables is between P2 to P5 only. This amount is not even enough to augment their capital. The farmers will just opt to throw them in the farm and be rotten than to give it to the middlemen. Another problem is the influx of goods as a result of globalization where products from Taiwan and China are much cheaper than the one from Mountain Province. In such context,

San Beda looked for solutions that will translate waste to additional income.

The potato chips came with CAS BCP team working with the members of the SBMVGA. Prof. Pilipino Ramos, CAS, Department of Accountancy served as a point person for the project while Engr. Zernan de Ramos took the mushroom growing initiative. Both professors mentored the students and Enactus members how the said processed vegetable products will be developed along the line of social entrepreneurship. ICIC oversees the entire project with the support of the SBC-BEFI.

Sustaining the Mushroom and Potato Chips Village Business Initiative And Students Cross Cultural Leadership Program

November 25-28, 2015

The members of the Entrepreneurship Action in Us (Enactus) monitored the financial status of the mushroom and the potato chips, and checked how the good manufacturing practices were applied in the community business. A total of 35 members of the St. Bede Mushroom and Vegetable Growing Association participated in two-day workshop. Manuals of Operation for the mushroom and potato chips business were drafted. This is an indicator of having a sustainability plan and can serve as one of the best features in the school's community engagement projects.



Zumba and Fun Run in the Mountain

November 28, 2015



The SBCBEFI and ICIC organized the zumba and fun run in the village entitled, Dasal, Indak and Takbo. There were 80 participants who did the unique fun run in the mountain wearing the Bedan singlets. The zumba was introduced as a warm-up activity. There were two youth runners who won the event, and can be a potential athlete scholars of the school.

College of Law-Legal Aid Bureau Strengthening Legal Aid Clinics Across the Country

The services of the San Beda Legal Aid Bureau have extended from the three satellite offices in Quiapo, main campus and Pandacan to mentoring programs in various law schools across the country.

Last May 8, 2015, the new batch of interns gathered various legal aid clinics in the Philippines. The national LAB convention was held in Pamanang Bedista with the financial support of the United States Embassy.

Last July 11, 2015 they accepted invitation from the Saint Louis University, Baguio City. On August 25, 2015 they went to Durnaguete City to supervise and share best practices with Silliman University. They expanded linkages that will include the Salonga Center for Law and Development. On September 14, 2015, San Beda College explored advocacy programs for the protection of refugees and stateless persons in partnership with the United Nations Higher Commission for Refugees with an orientation program for selected students. The US Embassy has been interested with our legal aid clinic that it sponsored the national convention for all legal aid bureau in the Philippines with San Beda as the host and lead school.



College of Law Legal Aid Bureau (COL-LAB) Participation in the United States Embassy Program on Institutionalizing Reforms to Promote Political Transparency and Good Governance on August 14, 2015 at the US Embassy, Manila



ICIC and COL-LAB were privileged to have been invited by the US embassy in participating their programs on good governance. The event was attended by 70 delegates mostly composed of lawyers and CEOs from various companies and organizations. San Beda College was the only school invited.

College of Medicine and Nursing Medical Missions in Mt. Province and Manila

There were 16 doctors and 12 medical interns from the College of Medicine and three from the College of Nursing who participated in the medical and surgical mission last summer. Last December together with the Mendiola Consortium, a total of 14 doctors joined the integrated medical mission in the Quiapo community in Manila.

The other new faces in the PCCL line-up were Calvin Offana, a 6'4" forward from Dumaguete, 6'6" Benedict Adamos from Bicol, point guard Kyle Carlos from La Salle Greenhills, and Cameroonian sensation Arnaud Noah, who was the 2014 NCAA Slam Dunk king (he was allowed to participate even when he was still completing his residency).



This year's squad will definitely be younger and quicker. Expected to lead the Red and White machine are incoming team captain Dan Sara, Ranbill Tongco, Javee Mocon, Tankoua and AC Soberano. The other prime candidates are third year players Jeramer Cabanag and Jun Bonsubre, and sophomores Joe Presbitero and Alfred Sedillo. But also fighting for a slot are Team B players and former Red Cubs Van Abatayo, Franz Abuda, Lance Abude, Kenneth Alas and Norrish Decapia, and fresh recruits 6'5" JB Bahio from Cebu, 6'5" William Navarro from Greece, and 6'8" Nigerian Eugene Toba.

Jarin will have the "happy" problem of selecting the final 15 from this deep pool of talents. During the summer, the Red Lions will likely have their annual training in Las Vegas, at Joe Abunassar's Impact gym.

Amidst today's rapidly changing landscapes, our San Beda College of Law continues to make its presence felt so strongly in the country since it was established in July 11, 1948.

The first law graduates of San Beda College took the Bar exams in 1952 registering a staggering 100% SBC passing percentage as against the 62% national passing percentage, sending Bedan spirits into a frazzle. But it was in 1953 when SBC produced its first-ever Bar placer Bernardo P. Fernandez who garnered fifth place. In 1954, SBC seized the country's admiration when it took pride in its first-ever Bar topnotcher Florenz D. Regalado. Based on the records for the period 1952 to 2001, SBC produced seven first placers, seven second placers and 52 fourth to tenth placers. Starting 1982, the San Beda College of Law opened its doors to female students. In 1985, SBC produced its first-ever three female Bar placers namely: Lilian B. Hefti, 3rd place; Lella M. De Lima, 8th place, and Mary Carolyn S. Que, 10th place. Truly a diamond achievement for a law school with humble beginnings.

Today, the San Beda College of Law is one of the top three acknowledged leaders of law education in the Philippines. In 2009, SBC produced another bar topnotcher Reinier Paul R. Yebra with Charlene Mae C. Topic placing second. Last year, SBC produced its first Bedan woman topnotcher in the person of Irene Alcobilla. Sharing the limelight were two other Bedan placers: Jose Angelo David, 6th place and Adrian Aumentado, 7th place.

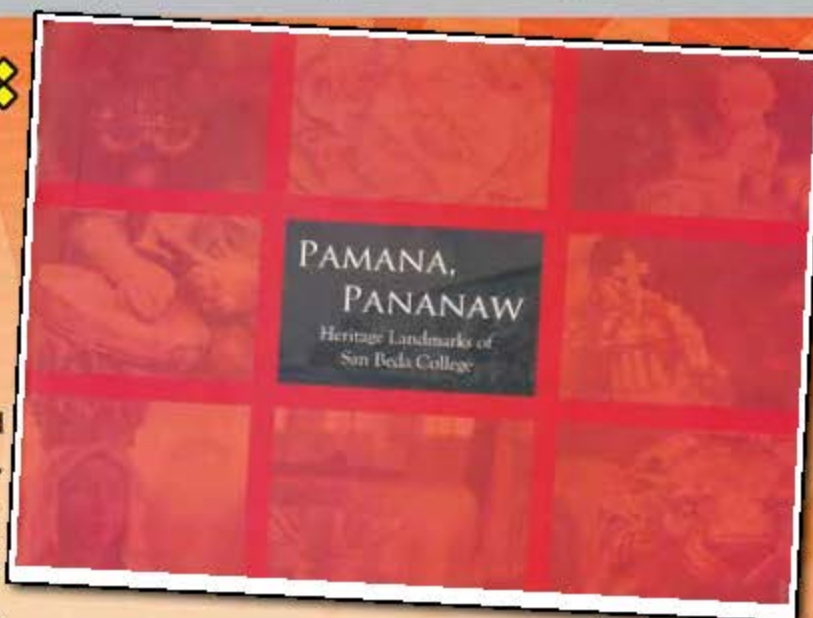

Nurturing the culture of research excellence in San Beda College

Research, Planning, and Knowledge Management Center

San Beda College is strongly committed to forge through the 21st century as an institution that creates, safeguards, and transmits knowledge that is instrumental in national social, economic, and spiritual development. Driven by this goal, the College embarks on a series of strategic initiatives for nurturing a productive culture of community-based research.

An Institutional self-assessment of research capability conducted during the 3rd quarter of 2015 showed that 20% of full-time faculty members are actively carrying out and disseminating research. Two-thirds of these active researchers have been identified to be in a position to serve as research mentors to the less experienced faculty. To augment the cadre of active faculty researchers, the Research, Planning, and Knowledge Management Center (RPKMC) will be organizing interdisciplinary research teams with the identified senior researchers serving as research mentors to the junior research faculty. These research groups will work on developing research concepts proposed in 2015 into complete research proposals, which will then be prioritized for institutional funding.

Another important research endpoint is to increase the number of faculty research publications in high-impact external academic journals. Faculty members who are active in research colloquia have independently identified external publication opportunities. RPKMC shall facilitate provision of institutional funding to support publication fee requirements of these external journals. As a further incentive, the San Beda Publication Awards, shall be bestowed on faculty who are able to publish in high-impact, indexed external academic journals.

The internal research publications of San Beda College such as *Scientia* are themselves efficacious media of faculty scholarship and research productivity. However, these are presently still to be accredited by the Commission on



Higher Education. The guidelines for accreditation are expected from the Commission this quarter, and the target is to have the internal research publications accredited in one submission cycle.

To provide one more venue for disseminating community-based research, RPKMC is coordinating with the Institutional Community Involvement Center (ICIC) on special issues of the San Beda Research Journal that will publish community-based researches done by the faculty. ICIC has assembled the editorial board and peer reviewers who will ensure the academic robustness of the articles in these issues.

Institutional research policies (including the SBC Institutional Research Agenda) for faculty research projects are well in place. However, the framework for technical and ethics review of research proposals and papers can still be enhanced to ensure that conduct of institutional research meets global best practice standards, particularly those pertaining to research ethics, which is a crucial requirement for external publication of research. Thus, research ethics will be one main theme of one of the faculty research workshops to be conducted by RPKMC. All full-time faculty researchers are to be trained in research ethics by the end of 2nd Quarter 2016. RPKMC will then form a working group composed of the key research faculty of the academic units as well as other faculty members specializing in Ethics and develop the San Beda College Code of Research Ethics and the San Beda College Ethics Review Board who shall be charged with ensuring the conduct of faculty research meets ethical standards. Ethics Review Board is envisaged to be operational by 2nd Quarter 2016 and accredited by the National Research Ethics Board at the end of 2016.

Likewise, there is a need to update frameworks for the technical review of research and benchmark them against



standards of high-impact external publications. RPKMC shall coordinate with the key research faculty and the research committees of the academic units to update these technical review frameworks to help ensure that the quality of faculty research outputs meets these standards.

RPKMC is itself a flourishing research management unit presently operated by one Director and one full-time administrative support staff. To further strengthen this research organization and infrastructure to effectively support faculty research productivity and ensure timely completion of institutionally-supported faculty research, RPKMC shall activate the Research Associates who will help manage the implementation of the institutionally-funded projects. The functional corps of Associates will enhance coordination with the research committees and research faculty of the academic units for updates on programs and feedback.

The current system of institutional research support makes funding for 10 faculty research projects available every year via the RPKMC grants, each amounting to PhP 80,000. This includes a research load equivalency of 6 units, which the faculty can choose in lieu of the monetary incentive. Additional institutional support for research is available through the Institutional Faculty and Staff Development grants for Masters and PhD studies. Support for faculty research is also available via the San Beda College Alumni Foundation Distinguished Professorial Chairs Program, which endows the institutional research program with PhP 1.125 million per year for the next 2 years. To further boost faculty research funding, additional RPKMC grants are to be added to the presently existing 10 awards. With the anticipated increase in the number of active researchers by 2017, additional sources of research funding shall be tapped. Faculty researchers shall be enabled to obtain external research grants, starting with capacity building for grant writing, and then followed through with grant networking opportunities.

These initiatives are the springboard for the continuing evolution of the research culture of San Beda College. RPKMC is keen on sustaining these undertakings, as well as meeting the continuing challenges of integrating research activity and academic learning, and supporting intellectual innovation for the betterment of society.
