

Designed for comfort and engineered for efficiency, the newest seaport hub is a project of port operator Manila North Harbour Port, Inc.

Located at the bustling Manila North Harbor, the new passenger terminal complex affords sea travellers unparalleled mobility in a secure, traveller-friendly and accessible complex. The terminal's sleek and contemporary look is a refreshing addition to the Manila Bay skyline.

Complementing the main terminal facility is an area dedicated for smooth and easy baggage handling and orderly waiting area for ticket processing. 

carefree high school and grade school days, be thankful for whatever achievements we have accomplished, and share the blessings that were made possible because of our remarkable Bedan education.

On a personal note, I look back with fondness being called a member of the notorious San Beda Eating Team, the forerunner of Elmo Ugot and Gomer Manabat's Drinking Team, who would frequent the infamous "hepa" alley and Mang Roger's Innocuous "balut". I then was told by my grandmother to avail of the school's clinic periodic immunization to spare me from diseases that may result from over-eating street foods. Instead, the school physicians, Dr. Rufinos Coronel and Dr. Elias Adamos, suggested that I change my diet to consuming more pizza with recycled sardines and hotdog toppings served by Kuya Mar in the school cafeteria. I found that it was a good alternative since I enjoyed the privilege of signed stub as a bench-warmer of the junior volleyball team of Coach Jimenez; thus, I would consume five bottles of Coke Eight with Beng Violago and kept the bottle chit for refund. In my opinion, we did not deserve those freebies though, because our team only won once, that was by default against Perpetual.

Back then, San Beda was the first school in Mendiola to #ForeverRED

have a swimming pool and being an all-male school, we would interact with our female counterparts in CEU, La Consolacion and Holy Spirit—using Patrick MacColl's binoculars. I vividly remember being an avid spectator of raucous fist fights between bullies led by the bulky Joma Santos, who is now a customs police, at the back of the swimming pool. In late afternoons, after being subdued by Verns Valdez in a one-sided arm wrestling, I would pack my Blabla shoes paired with Samboy Lim's long black socks (those were the fashion statement during those times before M Barretto and Drel Ledesma invented the red rubber stiletto) and head to my "Batang Bola" peers that included Benj Lopez, Dex Aseron (FIBA World Veteran Therapist), Reggie Torredes, Elgin Lacson, Doc Mark Rey Matias, Mike Magpili, Jerry Belen, John Martinez, Warren De Ocampo, Jun Almarlo, Edward Lavidez, Carlo Carillo and other basketball addicts. We would always get scolded by Sir Roger Bagulnon for missing our free throws in the wood-parquet covered court. But in the Junior Football Field that now converted into a parking lot,





I also remember scoring my first and only football goal in my entire life as an Azkal wannabe, thanks to the excess pounds of slow-footed goalie Mike Sy. This could be a fitting tribute to the iconic Football Coach Spanky Badolato (great guru of Myron Francia, Orlan Remorca and Alex Avnante). I shared with every batch mate the dream of being an athlete, thanks to Coach Ato's never ending tryouts. I did not make all of them.

Our History Class under Sir Lito Coronado would always be memorable, thanks to Mike Tjam's Miss July Playboy Centerfold Magazine and to the yellow pad codico of one Innovative seatmate.

Our class holds the distinction of

having invented the portable battery powered sound system created by the industrious minds of Carlo Atibula, Richie Guinto, Meo De Guzman, Carmellito Cervantes, Soteco and Fred Valmeo with Mr. Mayo at the helm. I vividly remember learning to dissect a frog under the astute eye of Sir Danny Seguban. Equally worth remembering would be the intellectual Ventura Babies who later became Sir Nonoy Tayao's cream of the crop; most of them are now successful engineers and chemists here and abroad. I would also always cherish the bronze Saint Benedict Medal given to me and Doc John Nabong by the late Brother Eli. This will always remind us that we are men of "Orat Labora". The retreats and recollections we had during those days would always be momentous, all thanks to the open forum with Rey Asis and Jokie Ada, and the escapade we

had with Joy Cajayon, Arvin Peñaflor and Jon Lacho in helping me carry an asleep

pajama-clad classmate outside the Manresa retreat house. Not to be outdone was Sir Ogie Velas' outdoor camping with Boy Scout braves Joma Marasigan, Jobu Buhain, James Labayo and Dave Doronilla. Despite of being a veteran Boy Scout, I was once scolded by Father Tarci and military-trained aselstant Principal Blanco for forgetting some lines of the Panatang Makabayan during our early morning assembly in the historical drummer by the flag-pole. Worth cherishing was Madam Adriano's Noli and Fili Feast with Glee Club loyalists Luke Hassaram, Carlo Carreon, Joey Briones and baritone Marion Manaoil belting out their best.

Further, cheers to my Student Coordinating Board buddies John Alindogan, Doc BJ Reyes (our class valedictorian), Simon Saberon and Vietnam based Lex Yap for the remarkable activities we had with Cata Figueroa during those days. To my active to my dynamic 4-45 classmates Alex Flores, Nars Villones, Ellas Manalastas, Mike and Ang De Vera, among others, kudos to you guys.

Not to be forgotten are my Subic adventure cohorts Mike Ramos, Allan Mina, Hawaii bound Roville Martin, nacholibre Jeffrey Andres, Kirby Hernandez and those who out of fear would not like to be mentioned. Remember a strong friendship doesn't need daily conversation and togetherness, as long as the relationship lives in one's heart, true friends will never be apart.

Those were our happy youthful school years together, and today, we are back to celebrate our silver jubilee of sharing in the beautiful memories of the past, of our enduring spirit in overcoming the challenges of the present, and of seeing through the bright promises of tomorrow.

CLARIFICATION OF AN IMPORTANT ISSUE

In page 9 of the last issue (*August to December, 2015*) of THE BEDAN ALUMNUS, I published a short article to clarify the important issue of who really was its real founder.

Constructing the statements of Atty. Juan Cabrero, our diligent Registrar for many years, with the assertions of Atty. Dante Q. Barbosa (AB '57, LIB '60), I concluded that I really was the founder of THE BEDAN ALUMNUS in 1962. I was right, but not totally. Why?

Casually, after the publication of the last issue of THE BEDAN ALUMNUS, I found among my old papers, the very first issue of THE BEDAN ALUMNUS I founded. Both in the nice cover and in the first page, it is clearly stated: *"August nineteen hundred and sixty-two. Vol. one. Number one."*

So, it is true that the first idea about the publication of THE BEDAN ALUMNUS came from the group that met in the year 1959 under the leadership of Atty. Dante Q. Barbosa and that, at least, three issues were published; but, apparently, it is also true that the magazine was not published regularly, for Mr. Francisco P. Valenzuela, the Alumni President for the year 1962 ordered me to take over the magazine and publish it "REGULARLY". Which I did. At that time, I was the Rector and the Alumni Moderator.

I left Manila in the summer of 1967, and returned for good on April 1, 2004. As we do not have the complete collection of THE BEDAN ALUMNUS, it is impossible to know the life of the magazine during that long period of time. But among the few copies of the magazine we have, the one giving an account of the centennial celebrations (2001), has only 12 pages, for two combined issues! It has the "Newsletter form".

DE LIMA'S FOUR DATES

LEILA DE LIMA follows the tradition of Bedans who have not only excelled in their chosen field as lawyers, but who have also gained fame for their uncompromising and incorruptible character as public leaders. In a short span of eight years during her stints as head of the Commission on Human Rights and as Secretary of Justice, she has easily earned the right to join the ranks of Rene Saguisag, Raul Roco, Augusto "Bobbit" Sanchez, and several others who hailed from the same Mendocino halls of the San Beda College of Law, as fighters for justice and democracy known for their courage and integrity. She was too young though to be counted among these Bedan leaders of the anti-dictatorship movement, having graduated Salutatorian of her law batch in 1985, the same year the country was at the cusp of liberation from the tyranny of the Marcos regime. The year of her graduation from the San Beda College of Law though proved auspicious, as she herself will soon be regarded as a leader of the generation of Bedans that will carry the torch passed on by their illustrious predecessors.

Indeed, fortune was written all over De Lima's life and career. She was born and spent her childhood in her hometown of Iriga City, Camarines Sur. Her father, Vicente B. De Lima, eventually became a commissioner of the Commission on Elections under President Cory Aquino. De Lima took up her pre-law history-political science degree at the De La Salle University before entering the San Beda College of Law. In law school, she not only graduated as salutatorian of her batch, but also eventually topped the 1985 bar examinations at no. 8. Her reputation in legal circles as one of the country's leading election lawyers promised her a lucrative legal career, until she was plucked from her private practice and appointed to head the Commission on Human Rights. At that time, the appointment was seen as a political move of the Arroyo Administration to deprive the opposition of her services, by giving the feisty election practitioner what was then considered a "safe" government position that did not invite much intrigue or controversy. De Lima proved everyone wrong.

The election lawyer who was not exactly known for making waves showed that given the right leadership and focus, the CHR was capable of becoming one of the more powerful government institutions to reckon with. She brought to the national consciousness the seriousness of the country's human rights situation. Leading the collegial body, she led fearless investigations on human rights violations committed by the Arroyo military and police forces. She showed that not all was well in the human rights front of the Arroyo Administration. Until De Lima happened at the CHR, nobody, least of all the administration, thought of the CHR capable of being a thorn on its side. Before long, the CHR was an item in everyday news, with exposés and investigations on government wrong-doing hitting the headlines, thus putting Malacañang Palace officials on their toes insofar as Arroyo's human rights record was concerned. The

most reorted investigations of the CHR during this time included the Davao Death Squad, the Maguindanao Massacre, the government offensive on leftist militants, and PNP and AFP excesses in anti-crime and anti-insurgency operations.

This was De Lima's first encounter with destiny. The second came when, to her own surprise, she was invited by President Benigno Aquino III to assume the powerful cabinet portfolio of Secretary of Justice. De Lima accepted, and was given presidential marching orders of delivering complete justice to all Filipinos, regardless of their station in life. She did not wait long to keep herself busy. Barely two months into the administration, she was called in to lead the investigation on the August 23 Luneta Hostage-taking incident. This set the trend for the rest of her tenure in the DOJ, as controversial and headline events that demanded the high-profile intervention of the DOJ came in regular succession in the next five years.

In November 2011, De Lima was accused of defying the Supreme Court when she prevented former President Arroyo from leaving the country and avoid answering criminal charges of election fraud. This act earned De Lima the ire of her own colleagues at the IBP, whose leadership was then still dominated by Arroyo and Corona allies. But this same act also made her popular among the public, as they saw the action of the Corona Court as nothing more than a feeble attempt to let Arroyo escape criminal prosecution. The public was only too happy to have somebody in the Aquino government stand up to the Court, and be the champion of a people clamoring to see justice served on the former president. For this act, disbarment cases were filed left and right by her own colleagues in the legal profession. However, the Court's action also eventually led to the impeachment of the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court.

As a result, De Lima's apparent third date with destiny was not to be. Touted as the President's top choice to replace an impeached Corona as Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, De Lima's bid for the position was bogged down from day one by the same disbarment cases filed against her as a result of her supposed "defiance" of the TRO issued by the same Supreme Court she now aspires to lead. While administrative cases likewise bothered other Supreme Court nominees, including Justices Antonio Carpio and Maria Lourdes Sereno, these were immediately dismissed, and the other candidates with qualification issues were cleared, in time to be considered in the JBC selection meetings. All except De Lima.

In the end, De Lima accepted her fate and continued her work as Secretary of Justice. Despite the seeming appropriateness of her middle name to the position she vied for as chief magistrate of the High Court, Magistrado will remain to be hers only in name, but not in title. But this seeming misfortune had its own blessings, as the appointment of Justice Sereno as Chief Justice paved the way for a closer and more fruitful relationship between the Department of Justice and the Supreme Court in the field of justice reform, where the two agencies led by the President's incorruptible women appointees worked hand in hand together to institute reforms in the delivery of justice in the country.

De Lima's failed bid to assume leadership over the third branch of government simply set her up for another, but more logical, fourth date with destiny, that might in time lead her to another branch of government. Armed with her record as an undeniable champion of both human rights and the fight for justice, and her sterling accomplishments and no-nonsense style of leadership, there was only one challenge left for the most popular member of the Aquino cabinet – the Senate. In her bid for the position of Senator of the Republic, De Lima has adopted the Justice agenda, letting her record of bringing senators, congressmen, an ex-president, and executive officials before the bars of justice speak for itself. Her run-up to the campaign carries the slogan "Mallaw na Hustisya". In the hope of letting the image of an uncompromising crusader for justice reverberate in an election exercise that gives premium to popularity and clarity of message.

Whether or not the Senate is indeed De Lima's fourth date with destiny, only time will tell. If surveys are to be considered, she is presently ranked anywhere from number 5 to number 9, thus assuring her, as of now, of being included in the Magic 12 in the race for the Senate in the 2016 elections. But whatever her fate is after May 9, 2016, one thing is sure, this lady Bedan has definitely left her mark in the public landscape of the country, probably more than any Bedan from the fairer sex, in such a short period of time. Wherever her destiny carries her, De Lima's legacy as a public figure is already assured. And for that alone, Laila De Lima has earned her place among the ranks of San Beda's notable alumni, an addition to their club that her mentor Senator Raul Roco will most certainly welcome.



TAX REFORM ADVOCACY: Fusing Development Economics and the Bedan Creed for the Common Good

Rep. Neri Colmenares entered San Beda in 1987 and finished his AB Economics in 1992. He was given the Distinguished Bedan Award in 2013 for 'Exemplary Government Service'. He was an Associate at the Asian Law Center when he was taking his PhD at the University of Melbourne. He is currently running for Senator in the 2016 Elections. He is the Senior Deputy Minority Leader and is on his last term as member of the House of Representatives. He authored the original SSS pension bill in Congress in 2011 and has been an advocate for social pension and tax reforms for years with bills to increase pension, lower income tax and eliminate VAT in gasoline, water and electricity charges. Among the bills he also authored are the Anti-Dynasty Law and the Freedom of Information Law.

Rep. Colmenares has authored several laws such as the Mobile Disaster Alerts Law to warn people of typhoons and calamities through text, creation of special election precincts for persons with disabilities and senior citizens, early voting for the media, recognition and indemnification for martial law human rights victims, the Anti-Torture Law and the Anti-Enforced Disappearance Law. As a lawyer, Neri has argued before the Supreme Court in various issues and has won some of the controversial cases that were decided by the Court the latest of which against the pork barrel in the form of PDAF and DAP. Rep. Neri was also one of the government prosecutors in the Impeachment Trial of then Chief Justice Renato Corona. He is an MCLE Lecturer of the IBP.

He was Chess Champion of Western Visayas and placed second runner up at the Palarong Pambansa at the age of 16. He and Shalimar are doting parents to son Ben.

I probably did not realize it then, but many of the principles I live by today sprung from my Benedictine education and its core values of *Ora et Labora*. Those were tumultuous times when I entered "Beda" in 1987, when a new government under Pres. Cory just came to power after years of martial law. I was previously the head of the Visayas Student Catholic Action and was part of a vibrant student movement demanding the return of student councils and school papers. It was, therefore, difficult for me to concentrate on my studies with raging demonstrations in Mendiola and coup d'états every now and then, such that I finished my Economics course in 1992, a year longer than my original batch mates.

Once I settled down, however, I began to gradually integrate the basic Benedictine Hallmarks of community with my social concerns, and not by chance, because the Benedictine sense of community stressed on the common good, love of Christ and neighbor and, of course, courage symbolized by our Red Lion. Some say that this Bedan courage sometimes lead me to take up "hopelessly Quibotic" battles such as my untiring fight against pork barrel and for lowering income tax in the country.

My latest quibotic dream, as some critics observe, is leading the fight for the first ever congressional override in history of a presidential veto on my bill increasing SSS pension. Why shoot for the moon, political pundits ask, and my usual answer is, I probably witnessed too many never-say-die basketball games of our Red Lions and was most likely inspired by their drive to "win them all" fearing neither "fire nor blood".

I enrolled in Economics after first choice Political Science was scrapped from the curriculum. I remember being made to read Todaro's economic theories by my young professor (whose name for the life of me I could not remember now and will be glad to be reminded). Although, I may have forgotten what I learned in that difficult subject called "Econometrics" I still hold dear and use unsparingly the economic development tools I acquired from Todaro which my professor said is suited for developing countries like ours.

I remember class discussions that pension increases and tax reductions have their macro economic benefits: the increase in people's spending power can help spur economic growth. The theory is that an increase in 'take home pay' brought about by pension increase or reduced taxes will be spent immediately since the Philippines has not achieved the stage when savings are affordable to most people. Additionally, if people can afford to buy nutritious food or medicine, this will even help the national health system as less people are vulnerable to sickness that in the long run will burden either the local or national health system.

My economics theories therefore were not limited to strict 'corporate' economics where policies are purely measured on its impact in government spending and revenue loss but also in combination with the Bedan predisposition for the common good and its impact on the people.

I digress now to one of my current advocacies—tax reform, and the need for the leadership of Bedans who stayed true to the Bedan spirit, especially those alumni in government. We should be at the frontline of a growing movement that rejects the trickle-down theory and see public good in outright unburdening the public from unjust impositions of our tax system.

We are overtaxed and underserved.

While many of us grumbled against excessive taxation for years it was only recently when this issue gathered momentum in our national discourse, brought about by the tax reform bills filed in both Houses of Congress. Of course, the fact that Pres. Benigno Aquino refused to support the measures on the ground that it will take away P29 Billion from tax revenues only added fuel to the debates.



Those earning more than P500,000 annual income have been taxed at a rate of 32% in 1987 through EO 37 issued by then Pres. Corazon Aquino, when the amount could have probably bought a small but decent house. The government continuously applied the same tax rate until now but the problem is, the P500,000 of 1987 has been seriously eroded by inflation and could not even buy a decent car.

According to a comparative study by the Tax Management Association of the Philippines (TMAP) the Philippines imposes one of the highest income tax in Asia. An annual income equivalent to P500,000 is taxed at 20% in Vietnam and Cambodia, 12% in Laos, 11% in Malaysia, 10% in Thailand and a meekly 2% in Singapore. This is made more painful by the fact that tax payers do not feel the services commensurate to this over-taxation, with the corruption, dismal health service, and the hellish triumvirate of bad roads, traffic and a dysfunctional MRT-LRT system.

This unjust imposition certainly violates the constitutional provision requiring a progressive system of taxation as those whose income are certainly nowhere near wealthy are taxed at the highest possible rate by government.

According to the 1986-2014 Consumer Price Index of the Philippine Statistics Office (PSO) national consumer prices

Salamat San Beda

I became quite busy after I became a lawyer and later a member of Congress that I forgot to really thank San Beda and the Bedan community for those memorable years of ora et labora. I write this short piece, not just to reminisce those wonderful college years and to encourage Bedan participation in the tax reform movement, but also, to thank San Beda for the great education, the camaraderie of our close knit Bedan community and the animus to fight like there is no tomorrow for needed reforms in our society. It was because of Beda that I learned the need to heed the clarion call, to work for the common good and have the courage to fight for it. San Beda has been a big influence during my student days. I am glad it is still a big part of me in my work for change and reforms.

have increased by 539% since Pres. Cory issued EO 37. Reading the PSO data, P500,000 in 1987 is now worth P2.7 Million. This is the reason why in House Bill 5842 which I filed in Congress, the highest tax rate is only imposed on those earning over P2.7 Million annually while an annual income of P500,000 only merited a 10% tax rate.

Additionally, the living wage in the Philippines is pegged at P1,086/day as of August 2014 according to research think-tank Ibon Foundation. A living wage is defined as "the minimum amount needed by a family of 8 members to meet its daily food and non-food needs plus 10% allocation for savings". The actual conditions however show that many of our workers are a long way away from living wage conditions. My assertion during the committee discussions was that if the living wage of about P30,000/month were taxed, the income earner will receive lower than living wage. HB 5842, therefore, provides that those earning an annual income of P396,000 (roughly about P30,000/month) should be exempted from income taxation.

Verily, there is a need for tax reform in the Philippines, a battle that must be waged vigorously. This includes the review of the imposition of Value Added Tax on gasoline, electricity and even systems loss. The author's bill taking out VAT imposed on systems loss passed the Ways and Means Committee after a spirited discussion on the absurdity of the imposition. If one were to be taxed with VAT for purchasing a bag for example, at least the tax payer brings home the bag. If one is imposed VAT for 'buying' systems loss, the tax payer brings home nothing. Government does not seem to care that there is no 'value added' in systems 'loss'. This particular measure may not get congressional approval due to time constraints and may require another battle in the next Congress. This situation, however, emphasizes the fact that absurdities and injustices such as these tax impositions do exist.

Thank You, Caloy

(August 29, 1930 – January 27, 2016)



Carlos "The Great Difference" Loyzaga, King of Philippine basketball from the early '50s to the mid '60s, is gone. He passed away January 27, 2016 at the age of 85.



Today's youth may never have seen him play, and a number of them wonder why numerous tributes continue to pour in from people from practically all walks of life.

Arguably, he considered by many sports fanatics as the greatest basketball player to ever represent the Philippines on the international arena. In the '50s, he was given the monicker "the big difference". This can be attributed to the fact that Caloy was simply the greatest on the basketball field both nationally and internationally, representing the country into Olympic games.



Loyzaga played collegiate ball with the San Beda Red Lions in the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) and then suited up for the Philippines in the 1952 and 1956 Olympics.

Loyzaga stood 6-foot-3 but was a dominant center in his time and led the Philippines to a third place finish in the World Basketball Championship in 1954—the country's best-ever finish—where he earned inclusion to the tournament's All Star team.

As a Makati Elem pupil and Rizal Hi stude, I read about iconic Caloy Loyzaga being called "Pomfret," among other monickers. Jack Pomfret was a legendary athlete in Canada, all-around, and was a member of four national basketball teams, including Canada's 1948 cage Olympic delegation in London (where Fil-Brit Victorial Manalolo/Dravis won two diving golds; father, musikero from Orani, Bataan who migrated to the U.S.).



The other morning, King Caloy left for a better world. Mendiola was OK in the 50's. I entered San Beda in 1955, when Caloy led the Red Lions in winning, after three championships, the coveted Zamora trophy, at a time when there were so many Yo-Soy-Bosoy Types among the priests, teachers and students; we sang with fervor cantemos al amor de los amores, cantemos al Señor, or no mas amor que el tuyo in our Friday Benediction or in our January procession for Santo Nino. We will remember him when we join this Sunday's Mendiola procession.

His son Chito says Caloy was a good family man, a Big Difference truly, given what we see today.

TYTYTYTY, Your Highness, we cannot thank and honor you enough, for what you have done for the country.

One of my few remaining thrills is guessing to what tune Our Father would be sung. Very conventional this time.

It was in the same church where we would sing decades ago, cantemos al amor de los amores, cantemos al Senor, Dios esta aqui, venid adoradores, adoremos, a Cristo Redentor. . . Good Ama Namin was familiar in tune this time; there are so many variations.

Chito led in signing the Bedan Hymn of Raul Roco and Fr. Maramba but the older generation did not seem familiar with it.


Last month, Dr. Jofre Alajar requested me to write an article for *The Bedan Alumnus* on how my ten-year experience as a grade-school and high-school student in San Beda impacted on my world-view.

Let me begin by recalling how I came to be interested in world affairs. I believe it all started when my parents gifted me with an inflatable globe. That was not exactly the most exciting Christmas present for a Grade Two kid. My father, Olimpio, although he was a physician and businessman, was a voracious reader and book collector. He made sure that the globe he gave me was put to good use, especially when I had history and geography as subjects in later years. If my memory serves me right, my elementary teacher in basic geography and history was Mr. Lhwanag, and my high school teacher in those two subjects was Mr. Bernardo. Using the map of the world as teaching aid, they gave inspiring lectures that made us appreciate the relationship between the location and climate of the countries of the world, and their economies, politics and cultures. It also helped that the San Beda library was stacked with books about civilizations and great leaders that enriched the imagination of our generation of Bedans.

Little did I know then that I would be pursuing graduate studies in International Relations, that it would be my field of specialization in teaching and research, and that I would someday be serving as ASEAN Deputy Secretary-General and later, as Ambassador to ASEAN.

The discipline and fine values that I imbibed during my formative years guided me in my pursuits. The Benedictine monks who headed our institution during my time were Spaniards—Rev. Fr. Wilfrido Rojo was our Rector and subsequently our Abbott; Rev. Fr. Benigno Benabarré was my Grade School Principal; and Rev. Fr. Sergio Martínez, my High School Principal. They were strict but fair, but most of all, they never posed any obstacle to the development of nationalism in our education. As a matter of fact, they encouraged love of country and world peace in their messages and homilies.

The works of art in San Beda's campus also left an indelible mark on my consciousness. The original buildings were designed in the Neo-Gothic tradition by Swedish architect George Aap. Our daily masses and benedictions were held inside the renowned chapel of the Abbey of Our Lady of Montserrat. Its chapel with its majestic fresco paintings, enchanting pipe-organ music played by Fr. Ortega, and the pre-Vatican II hymns in Latin were unforgettable. The mural paintings were done by Father Lesmes Lopez and Brother Salvador Alberich. The most impressive are the depictions of heaven and hell in the pinnacle of the apse above the altar, and the Stations of the Cross. Having been immersed in such Renaissance-inspired artistic treasures profoundly globalized our aesthetic sense.

Aging lions return to their lair

And, it has been 40 years since our high school graduation night when as we were heading to join our family for the celebration, our principal, Fr. Tarci, in a last-ditch effort at redemption, suddenly herded us into the St. Anselm's Conference Hall for his memorable farewell homily. We were his most difficult batch in all his four years of being principal, he said. We made a living hell out of his life, he said. Well, he had formally made his apology during our silver reunion in 2001 as he saw what many of us have become. Personally, I am grateful for that good riddance speech. It was a humbling experience for everyone. For him, too, he said.

But has our batch grown wiser? With the beginning signs of falling health and faculty coupled with lifestyles that are far from ideal and hard to shed, our 40th reunion has become a must-attend event; many realize that they will not be around ten years from now.

We grew up during tumultuous times. Yes, more tumultuous than today. We had a good view of Mendiola Bridge from our classrooms. And we learned in elementary that you don't drink molotov cocktails and you don't see pillboxes in medicine cabinets. Some of us even learned how to prepare them. We witnessed organized groups of Jeepney drivers and activist students march up to Malacanang from Mendiola in impressive phalanxes chanting "Makibakal! Huwag matakot! Marcos, ibagsak!" And we were taught to dive to the floor upon hearing any explosion because we often talked about how the shrapnel of exploding pillboxes and grenades behave when they hit ground and how Metrocomshoot with their armalites.

And, we were called "martial law babies" as we welcomed a shortened freshman year in high school in 1972. However, we were like restless lion cubs as the pack leader, Fr. Tarci, had a terrible time managing our frat wars, our





bloody skirmishes with students from Baste, the occasional exploding toilet and the occasional whiff of burning hemp in the classrooms. (I have to point out here that many of these practices were instigated by an older batch.) We knew martial law had been declared – the barbed wire barricades at the bridge, Metrocom in full battle gear, and the massive tanks were constant reminders – but we were teen-agers with dysfunctional proclivities. And we had to live up to how we were called in the government-controlled press: Bedan boors!

And so our school attempted to innovate. Individualized instruction came in and a pilot class was started. This eventually gave birth to San Beda Alabang which was then called the Benedictine Abbey School. Growth in Personhood became a new subject in the hope of putting some dirt of civility to the boors. And, we were the first school to have an elective student council in the so-called "New Society". It was called the Student Coordinating Board. And we were taught a new battlecry: "Leadership is Service! Service is leadership!" And we were allowed to sit in a board of discipline right across the dreaded Mr. Blanco, Prefect of Students, and dear reprimanding Fr. Tarcl as they discuss the fate of erring schoolmates. And we were one of the first schools to come out with the school paper and we had free rein on content so long as they remained domestic in scope. San Beda did well given the repression and pervasive fear.

The lions are again going home to their lair. We hope to rekindle friendships and to reminisce good and bad times in the usual abandon and mirth. We bring stories of our struggles and our victories, big and small. But like lions that have left its lair for too long, we go home to replenish. And we have grown wiser as we now value more than ever, our friendships, and recall the people who mattered the most in our lives. –
