Rector-President

A little over 1000 days ago, I took on the helm of San Beda College with a focused determination to drive the college to where the rest of world is going in pursuit of academic excellence and genuine service to the world. With the steadfast support of my brothers in the Benedictine community and the college administrators, I am happy to report that, in the past three years, we have prepared the building blocks for the college as it faces a completely different landscape compared to what we first saw in May of 2010.

Today, we are confronted with the challenge of a revolutionalized basic education system that impels us to rethink our vision for and formation of our young students.

Indeed, the relationship between our basic education program in our Rizal campus and our higher education program in Manila may have to be less than the seamless continuum that we got used to for many years.

We certainly have turned around the college in relation to its reputable standing among peer colleges and universities. The Philippine Accrediting Association of Schools, Colleges and

accountancy, entrepreneurship and liturgy.

In the aspect of academic reform, we have established the Academic Council as the highest policy making body on matters of quality assurance, thematic research agenda, faculty rank, tenure and promotion, and the school's long-term strategic directions. We have engendered a culture of accountability of academic departments and the service support units through requisite



submissions of three-year action plans and regular, semestral accomplishments reports.






In Basic Education, we have created nurturing environments for our primary and secondary school students. We have updated our instructional materials, to match international standards. Our teachers have introduced the differentiated instruction model complemented by improved teachings methods and strategies, to suit the learning needs and capacities of our students. These have resulted in significant improvements in our students' performance in standardized national examinations administered by the Department of Education. In order to enrich classroom instruction, we have expanded our students' co-curricular activities which enable students to actualize their potentials as leaders, innovators and artists, instill the value of cooperation and invigorate the student community spirit.

The College of Arts and Sciences (CAS) has seen an average of 8% increase in student enrollment annually in the past three years. Student experience in the CAS is notable for a number of milestones. In reinstating Wednesday classes, more hours have been added for quality classroom instruction. CAS students have demonstrated excellence in intercollegiate and national academic competitions in accountancy, marketing, entrepreneurship and financial management. We have established new mechanisms for student feedback and bolstered student leadership programs and co-curricular activities that enhance the classroom experience and provide opportunities for students to demonstrate leadership and creativity as well as unleash innovative ideas.

ENROLLMENT IN THE COLLEGE OF NURSING (2010-2013)








The San Beda College of Medicine has more than doubled its population over the past 5 years. With the implementation of the curriculum in 2008, the students' learning experience expanded beyond the traditional lecture-based classroom scenarios. Students in all year levels were introduced to problem-based learning for their small group discussion to reinforce the traditional lectures they received in class. Laboratory activities were increased in the basic sciences and more opportunities for student-patient interaction were created. Patient simulation was added into the activities for year levels 2 and 3 enhancing the critical thinking and deductive skills of the students as they worked to find the correct diagnoses and management of the cases.

The college provides the students with co-curricular activities to enhance their experience in school and provide them with opportunities to develop leadership skills and creativity. The Association of Philippine Medical Colleges (APMC) Student Network is an organization of medical students of the different medical schools in the country. It allows the students to develop their leadership and it also provides the students the opportunity to display their talents in various APMC sponsored competitions between medical schools providing them with the break from the very heavy schedule of a medical student.

For the past three years, the Graduate School of Liturgy has produced the country's leading liturgists and remains as the leading resource on liturgical scholarship.






ENROLLMENT IN THE GRADUATE SCHOOL OF LITURGY (2010-2013)












Faculty Initiatives and Research



San Beda College's Institutional Community Involvement Center (ICIC) remains at the forefront of providing meaningful opportunities for community engagements and volunteerism by members of the SBC community. In the past three years, it has mobilized hundreds of Bedan volunteers, serving five partner communities and benefiting more than a thousand individuals and families, particularly in times of natural calamities.

Its most significant achievement is working with its partner communities in developing a sustainable community development plan that harnesses community—based resources and initiatives, with San Beda College providing technical support whenever such support has been identified and asked for by the communities themselves. Through its extensive legal aid program, leadership skills, and livelihood training workshops, ICIC serves as a channel for the Bedan community to work productively with resource-challenged communities, and at the same time, bring in these significant human life experiences as a part of classroom discussions and research.

Revenue came from tuition fees, miscellaneous and other school fees and from other revenues.


For academic year 2010-2011, 67.72 % of gross revenue came from tuition fees, 29.09% from miscellaneous and other school fees, and 3.19 % from other revenues.







For academic year 2012-2013, the projection of 70.36% of gross revenue will come from tuition fees, 26.26% from miscellaneous and other fees, and 3.38% from interest income.

For academic year 2011-2012, 70.07 % of gross revenue came from tuition fees, 27.68 % from miscellaneous and other school fees, and 2.25 % from other revenues .








The ratio of expenses to gross revenue for academic year 2010-2011 was 86.36%; for 2011-2012, the ratio was 90.86%, and for 2012-2013, expenses are projected at 90.8 %.

Expenses were distributed as follows: In academic year 2010-2011, salaries, wages and benefits were 61.82% of total expenses; 0.98% for faculty and staff development; 3.41% for supplies, and 33.78% for other expenses.

64.57% of the total expenses in academic year 2011-2012 went to salaries, wages and benefits; 1.47% to faculty and staff development; 3.19 % for supplies and 30.77% for other

expenses.


For academic year 2012-2013 salaries, wages and benefits are projected to take 63.02% of total expenses; faculty and staff development, 1.96%; supplies, 3.81% and other expenses, 31.22%.





St. Bede's Inner Courtyard, San Beda College, Rizal Campus


